Mayor La Guardia And Mr. Whalen To Lead Amusement Festivities

Weather permitting. . . . Mr. Grover Whalen and Mayor La Guardia get their horseback ride tonight.

For tonight is the night-again, weather permitting—when the Amusement Area puts on its grand review. And Mr. Whalen and Mayor La Guardia lead the parade, preceded by the usual police escort, 24 Haskely Indians, B. A. Rolfe's Band on a real band wagon, and the color guard.

The order of march goes out at 8:45 P. M. from the Cavalcade of the Centaurs exhibit at the southernmost end of the Amusement

In the line of march following the white chargers on which Mr. Whalen, president of the Fair, and Mayor LaGuardia will ride, are Beauty Contest winners in taxicabs, the Cavalcade company of dare-devil riders, Scotch girl bagpipers, foreign performers and exhibitors in native costume and Ginger Vess, the girl of the "Slide for Life." Miss Vess also rides a

The parade moves up the east road, turns left at Ballantine's restaurant opposite the Children's World, then passes the Hall of Music and the Billy Rose Aquacade, then south on the west road, returning to the Cavalcade, the starting place.

But the parade line-up is only part of the show, important as it is. For as the parade moves along its merry way, performers in each of the concessions will greet it. Streamers and confetti will be released as the performers give a free showing of their act.

Once back at the Cavalcade, the official party will take its place on the reviewing stand. Miss Vess will be introduced to the Mayor and Mr. Whalen.

Flares will light the way as she plunges down the wire and into Fountain Lake and as she swims to shore. Her bow to the applause of the thousands of visitors will be the signal for the release of a gigantic fireworks display.

At 10:40 P. M. the schedule performance moves inside the Cavalcade where Mr. Whalen and Mayor La Guardia continue the parade.



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


